CONSULAR DAYS ARE BACK

The Consulate General of Croatia from Los Angeles, California will be available for Consular Days on Sunday October 1st from 12:00 – 4:00 pm on the 3rd floor of the Seattle Center Armory for passport renewal, citizenship applications, and notary services. Please make sure to bring copies of all required documents - they will not be able to accept incomplete applications.

Citizenship applications require two packets with all required documents: one original set and one complete copy for each individual applying. Copies cannot be made on site.

BY APPOINTMENT ONLY

HRVATSKI NOGOMET—CROATIAN FOOTBALL



The beloved Croatian national football team — colloquially known as Vatreni (“the Blazers”) and Kockasti (“the Checkered Ones”) — has qualified for every major football tournament since 1994, except for Euro 2000 and the 2010 World Cup.

Croatia’s national team, in fact, has become a fixture at recent FIFA World Cups, qualifying for six of the last seven tournaments, including Qatar 2022. At the World Cup, Croatia has finished second once, in 2018 (losing to France in a heroic effort), and in third place twice (1998 and 2022.) Croatia’s surprise run up to the 2018 World Cup final was a fairytale story, clinching the team a spot among football’s international elite.

The Croatian football team’s modern-day history is illustrious — a source of pride for Croats both within Croatia and outside. In 1990, an unofficial Croatian football team was formed; in 1991, Croatia declared its independence; in 1992, the new country was ‘readmitted’ to FIFA (the International Federation of Association Football). In 1990, the Croatian squad played friendly matches against the U.S, Romania, and Slovenia, winning all three. This was the first time that

Croatia played in its signature red-and-white checkered jerseys, inspired by the country’s checkerboard coat of arms.

Most recently, in the 2023 Nations League (55 member nations), the Vatreni topped their group, knocking out reigning champions France and advancing to the finals. Croatia ultimately lost to Spain in a heartbreaking overtime penalty shootout (5-4). Despite being beaten at one of their core strengths, the team played well in an open and even game — Croatian fans could be proud.

Although Croatia is close to last in World Cup nation population size (ahead of Uruguay, Iceland, and Qatar), Croatia’s nogometna reprezentacija has distinguished itself in the international arena of the world’s most popular sport.

The Croatian football team is the pride of Croatia and its people. Names like Modrić, Perišić, Brozović, and Livaković, not to mention Šuker, Boban, Prosinečki, are emblazoned in Croatia’s sports pantheon — and in football history.

Croatia — a newly minted nation — became known to the world through football. Our Croatian football team, in all its glory, embodies the spirit of a nation to become sovereign.

SEATTLE CENTER 1st Ave N Garage - 220 1st Ave N., Seattle, WA 98109. (Entrance on Warren Ave. N.)

There are several smaller parking lots around the area, and there are several parking apps that can help find available lots and their prices. Street parking is free on Sundays.

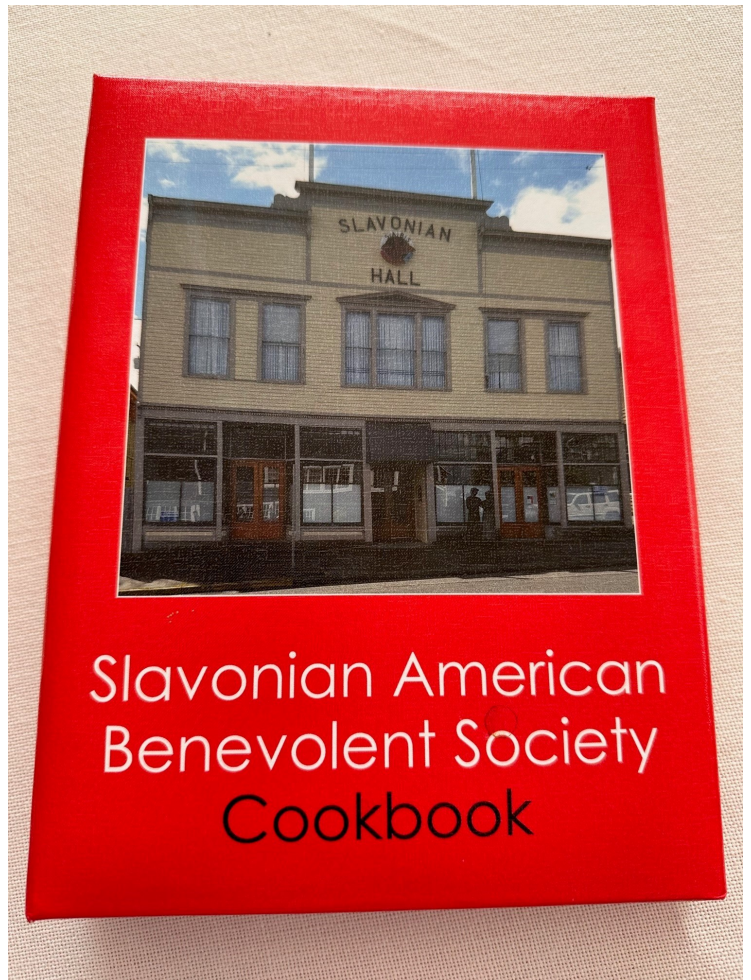
SABS GIFT BOOTH

THE DOMOVINA BIRTHRIGHT PROGRAM

This is an unforgettable experience for young adults of Croatian descent between the ages of 18 and 30 who want to learn about their Croatian heritage, explore the beauty and excitement of Croatia, connect with their Croatian identity, and meet other young Croatian adults.

“I CHOOSE CROATIA—WORKFORCE MOBILITY”

The aim is to strengthen business activities and increase their range in most parts of the Republic of Croatia.

Scholarships for members of the Croatian diaspora to study in Croatia

The main goals of this project are to strengthen educational and scientific cooperation with the Croatian community abroad, strengthen the roles of educated individuals in their local communities, and promote the involvement of Croats abroad in Croatian social and political life.

SPECIAL ENROLLMENT QUOTAS

Several higher education institutions have provided special enrollment quotas for members of the Croatian national minority and the Croatian diaspora: University of Zagreb, Catholic University of Croatia, Josip Juraj



Strossmayer University of Osijek, University of Split, University of Zadar, University North of Varaždin and College of Applied Sciences “Lavoslav Ružička” in Vukovar.

FREE A1 AND A2 LEVEL ONLINE CROATIAN LANGUAGE COURSES

One of the most important identity features of both a person and a nation is language. Therefore, we have provided free and high-quality online Croatian language courses both to those of our compatriots who have little or no command of the Croatian language and to all other people wishing to learn it.

These are all programs of the State Office for Croats Abroad. The State Office also issues two tenders a year, which Croatian societies and clubs abroad can apply for. The funds, which are quite significant, can be allocated for specific projects.

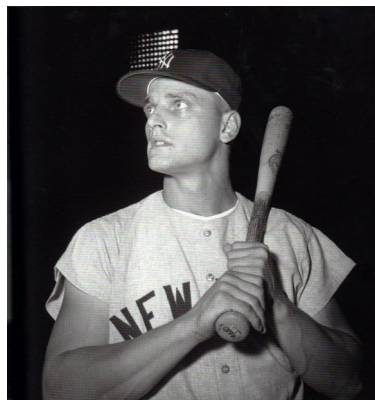

CROATS IN SPORT EXHIBIT RETURNS

A lot has happened in the world of Croatian sport since our exhibit first debuted in 2010, so we have decided to add to our collection of museum quality panels, chronicling Croats in sport. We will highlight Croatian Americans locally and nationally and will have a look at Croatia's participation in international competitions, particularly soccer's famed Euro Cup and World Cup.

Did you know that Roger Maris was born to Croatian parents in Hibbing, Minnesota? Maris (Maras) was a baseball right fielder who played 12 seasons in Major League Baseball. He is best known for setting a new MLB single-season home run record with 61 home runs in 1961. The record remained unbroken until 1998 and remained the American League (AL) record until Aaron Judge broke it in 2022.

Are you familiar with Visco Grgich? Grgich was born on the island of Zlarin, Croatia, but grew up in West Seattle's Riverside neighborhood. He attended college at Santa Clara and was a lineman in the All-America Football Conference and the National Football League, where he played seven seasons for the San Francisco 49ers. Grgich was known as a tough and sometimes vicious two-way lineman who loved to intimidate Norm Van Brocklin. Grgich was also known for his rousing pep talks prior to games and was even brought back by Coach Frank Albert to give pep talks after his playing days were through. At the end of his pep talk, Grgich would say "This is the way you've gotta do it!" and would promptly deliver a forearm shiver to the nearest door, wall, or even one of the wooden support posts in

Kezar Stadium, which was rumored to be felt throughout Kezar Stadium.

Do you remember Paul Skansi? Born in Tacoma and with roots that trace back to Sumartin on the island of Brač, he played wide receiver in college for the Washington Huskies. He was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers and spent most of his NFL career playing for the Seahawks.

Did you happen to watch the 2015 Super Bowl, where Pete Carroll and Bill Belichick, the head coaches of the Seattle Seahawks and the New England Patriots, made history when, for the first time, two coaches of Croatian descent faced off in the Super Bowl?

Any Mariners fans out there? How many of you cheer for Jarred Kelenic? Were you one of the hundreds of fans dressed in the iconic red and white shirts who attended Croatian Heritage Night at the Mariners in 2022 and 2023?

We will look at the careers of Goran Ivanisevic, Ivica and Janica Kostelić, Iva Majoli, Borna Ćorić, Marin Čilić, the late Dražen Petrović, Krešimir Ćosić, and many more.

A panel will be devoted to the Sinjska Alka equestrian event held in the Dalmatian town of Sinj, which has been added to the UNESCO List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity. Please visit this special exhibit in the Art Gallery on the 3rd floor of the Armory.

FAVORITE FOOD VENDORS RETURN & ĆEVAPI AND LAMB ARE BACK!

Come to CroatiaFest hungry! A variety of traditional Croatian foods are available for purchase both inside and outside of the Seattle Center Armory.

OUTSIDE THE ARMORY

Yes, our favorite grilled meats are back! Balkan Store will be grilling ćevapčići (Croatian-style sausages) with lepinja (flatbread) and condiments and BBQ lamb sandwiches with accompaniments.

INSIDE THE ARMORY

On the main floor of the Armory, the Balkan Task Force will offer palačinke (Croatian crepes) and baklava. You can also purchase a cup of Croatian kava (Turkish coffee) to go along with these sweets.

The American Slavic Women's Club will be selling povitica, a popular sweet bread made with yeast-raised dough layered with dense walnut filling. You will be able

to purchase slices of povitica or whole loaves.

Baked in Bosnia will serve traditional Croatian sarma (stuffed cabbage rolls). They will also be selling slices of their delicious apple and bee sting cakes and some new surprises—pita/burek and princes krofne (cream puffs).



CROATIAFEST WINE CELLARS

Join us this year at the CroatiaFest Wine Cellars located upstairs on the 3rd floor of the Armory from 1:00 – 5:00 PM for a day of wine tasting with our Croatian-American vintners and wine shops. Tickets are only \$15.00 at the door. With your admission, you will receive a beautifully etched commemorative CroatiaFest wine glass, or, new this year, you may choose to receive an etched CroatiaFest shot glass to use to taste Šljivovica (plum), Maraschino (cherry), Kruškovac (pear), or Orahovac (walnut) liquors from Croatia.



We are thrilled to welcome back Jason Morin and his Ancestry Cellars of Woodinville. Jason is a Croatian-American vintner who began learning to make wine with his grandfather. True to the winery name, each of Ancestry's wines are created with purpose and a family story behind each bottle. Balkan Store will also return to the wine room with wines imported from Croatia that you can find at their Lynnwood store.

VIDEO SPOTLIGHT: ANACORTES AND GIG HARBOR

During 2020 and 2021, CroatiaFest had to get creative when thinking about how to put on a virtual festival. One of the first projects we decided to take on was to spotlight towns within the Pacific Northwest where Croatians have a long history. We wanted to get the stories behind these dynamic neighborhoods right from the source, so that's just what we did.

During our 2021 virtual festival, we produced and aired programs highlighting Anacortes and Gig Harbor—two communities with deep ties to Croatia. We will be re-airing those programs during our 2023 festival.

In these programs, we interviewed locals of Croatian descent and some who even immigrated from Croatia themselves. They shared heart-felt stories of the joys, challenges, and triumphs they experienced growing up Croatian. They talked about what being Croatian meant to them, and what the Croatian community as a whole meant to their lives, their towns, and the industry that these two towns shared—fishing.

We visited notable sites and spoke with historians and museum curators who were an encyclopedia of knowledge, specifically regarding the impact Croatians had in the early days of these two towns.

COOKING DEMONSTRATIONS

CroatiaFest is pleased to have two live cooking demonstrations again this year!

Sisters Marija Mataja and Toni Stipetić will demonstrate Knedle sa Šljivama, Croatian plum dumplings made with a mashed potato dough that can be eaten as a dessert when sprinkled with sugar, as a meatless main course, or as a starch accompanying a meat dish.

Joanne Martinis is back, this time demonstrating the late Margaret Barhanovich's signature cookie, Pol

Mjesec (half-moon). Joanne has very fond memories of enjoying these cookies as a child at the Barhanovich house in Everett, and as a young adult over coffee, always with Margaret. The cookies are made from cake, which is cut into crescents using a water glass after it's cooled. The cake is made with rum and lemon peel and is topped with finely chopped walnuts and sugar.

Both demonstrations will be held upstairs at the third-floor cooking stage.

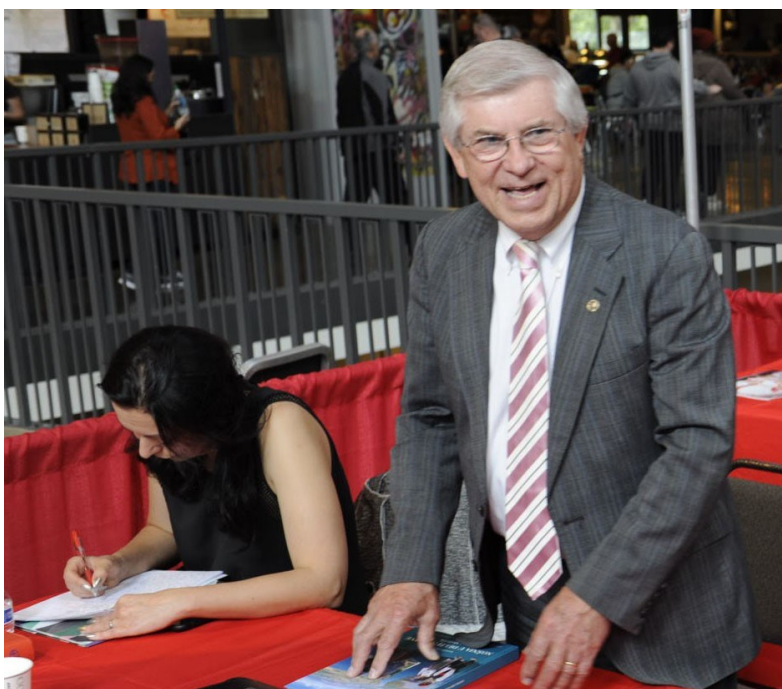

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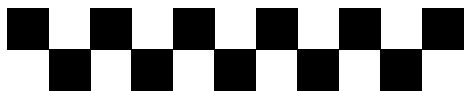
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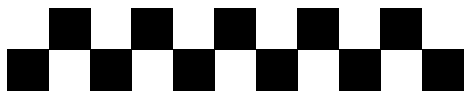
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
